The workshop will focus on mapping the journeys, real and imagined, of immigrants from Mexico to the US. The mapping will be a visual narrative, layered or t, with contemporary and historic moments the local flora, fauna, ICE detention centers, sites of refuge, etc. We will pay particular attention to the visual and symbolic dimensions of the materials and colors used to create a "painterly story" of an immigrants journey.
