Course Description

Offered over six full days (Friday, September 20 to Wednesday, September 25) the Urban Humanities Summer Institute introduces students to thick mapping as one of the core methodological approaches of urban humanities and provides an opportunity for interdisciplinary research and collaboration. Class time will be divided into lecture/seminar sessions, methods workshops, lab/studio sessions, on-site fieldwork in the Westlake/MacArthur Park neighborhood of Los Angeles, and reviews where work produced will be presented and given critical feedback by instructors and guest critics. The UH Summer Institute is one of the components of the first 2-credit methods courses required for a graduate certificate in Urban Humanities and is the first course in the year-long sequence dedicated to studying Los Angeles (Westlake District), Tijuana (Colonia Libertad and Playas), and Mexico City (Xochimilco and Historic Center).

Through Thick Mapping students will immerse themselves in the cultural, social and spatial context of the Westlake area, with a special focus on MacArthur Park and its surrounding neighborhood. Thick Mapping-as-methodology will serve as the framework for our ethnographic spatial analysis of the Westlake/MacArthur Park area, and is the first of several core Urban Humanities methodologies (film and visual art will be introduced in later workshops) through which we will investigate this year's overarching and transnational theme of *Borders and Commons*. These hybrid strategies will help us in creating a layered, multi-dimensional and nuanced portrait of the Westlake/MacArthur Park area that can be used to generate future speculative *Engaged Public Art and Architectural and Urban Design* projects.

In addition, the Westlake area, and its current social and spatial dynamics dramatically transforming it, will be seen as a *microcosm* of the larger forces affecting contemporary Los Angeles, and potentially other large US cities experiencing similar social and spatial changes.

Grading Criteria*

75% = Thick Mapping Westlake <u>Project Brief</u> and <u>Rubric</u>

25% = Attendance and participation in all aspects of the Summer Institute

The Thick Mapping Project will be realized collaboratively and will require students to work in interdisciplinary teams. While exact project roles will vary and not everyone will be approaching the project with the same expertise and disciplinary knowledge, all students are expected to make similar contributions in terms of commitment, effort, research, and execution. To reflect upon this first collaborative experience of UHI, all team members will have the opportunity to write-up a brief, confidential description of their experience during the institute, and to provide honest feedback on what worked and what could be improved in terms of assignment expectations, working collaboratively within your teams, and final outputs. Teams will be assigned to balance discipline and experience, and students are expected to work on the same teams for the duration of the Summer Institute. The summer project components are designed to build on one another and launch ideas for a long-term project dedicated to

the theme of "Borders and Commons," which will be refined and realize over the course of the academic year.

*Your overall grade for the Summer Institute will comprise 50% of the 2-unit methods course (AUD 289-10) which you have already registered for the Fall quarter. The other 50% of your grade will come from the film project, to be assigned at the beginning of Fall quarter.
